



Fruit Bat

The Seychelles fruit bat eats fruit and nectar and helps disperse the seeds of many trees.



Takamaka

Now a protected species in the Seychelles, the takamaka tree's tough, waterproof wood was once favoured by pirates for repairing boats damaged during battles.



Frangipani

A frangipani tree marks the entrance to each villa compound, symbolising harmony and romance and filling the air with a delicate, tropical fragrance.



Hibiscus

These showy flowers grow freely throughout the Resort. We infuse them to make the vibrant hibiscus tea that is served to guests when they first arrive.



Seychelles Charmoleon

A little known, endemic species that adjusts its colour to match its surroundings. Can you spot one? Harmless and peaceful, it catches insects with long, sticky tongue.



Blue Pigeon

Big Game Fishing

From marlin, yellow fin and big eye tuna to swordfish, rainbow runner and kingfish, experience the year-round thrill of landing a big prize in pristine azure waters.

- Moderate terrain with reasonable elevations and some stairs.
1 loop = 0.8 km (0.5 mile)
2 loops = 1.6 km (1 mile)
- Suitable for experienced runners or power walkers.
Adequate for walking as it affords stunning views of the bay.
1 loop = 2 km (1.2 mile)
